**Ian Ramsdale looks forward to today's Challenge**



Every sportsman or women loves a challenge, it's part of their competitive nature, and a test against the best is always the pinnacle.

Manly are the top team in the NRL and today the Quins have an opportunity to compare themselves, pound for pound, with Australia's number one side.

Speaking after last week's Round 1 victory, head coach Brian McDermott said, "Back when I played, if someone had said to me, as a prop, 'do you want to go against one of the best props in the NRL?' then I'd have got excited about that, and thought 'yeah, I find that a challenge'."

Harlequins RL's Jon Wells told BBC London 94.9's London Rugby League programme this week he's just looking forward to pulling the shirt on today, "It's been very difficult to push it to the back of your mind, and we get the chance, this weekend, to soak it up".

Let's not over-sell it, the Sea Eagles are treating this game as a warm-up for the World Club Challenge, with all their 23 players likely to get a hit-out. But, 'for their next trick', they face Leeds Rhinos, so they're likely to want some pretty good practice today...

The result is almost irrelevant. I say almost, this is the biggest game since the club became Harlequins Rugby League in 2006, and it's much more than just a points total.

The extra-attention brought to the club just by hosting the game will be valuable, and in that respect, a win for the pastel quarters could help. People are always more likely to come back if their team win, but I wonder how many have come along to watch Manly claim a victory ...

"The main goal of the guys is to get out there and win," said Harlequins RL's Jon Wells, and I'm sure the Sea Eagles are just as keen. The desire to win is in every player's blood. No side likes to lose, even if it is just a challenge match.

And with the RFL saying this is the "first ever" London Rugby League Challenge, who knows, it could become a regular fixture?

A game like this, in the capital, can only aid the development mechanisms we know already exist. Although maybe it won't be long until the RFL take the game to an other development area ... Then again, there's not too many Aussies in Wales.
